The City of Spokane COVID-19 News Update for March 16 (#2)

Information about Coronavirus Disease 19 (COVID-19) is evolving rapidly. We want to make sure our City employees have up-to-date information. We will provide this update, as needed, to communicate what you need to know, while we work to reduce the spread of this disease in our community and continue to provide critical public services. This chart, from the Washington State Department of Health, provides a look at the levels of a health emergency and indicates where we are as a community. (Currently, we are at Level 4.)

Child Care Survey

Human Resources has sent department heads the information they need to proceed with collecting that data.

Emergency Declaration

Mayor Nadine Woodward signed an emergency declaration today related to the COVID-19 situation. Spokane County and the City of Spokane Valley also signed emergency declarations, and smaller cities throughout the County are making plans to do the same. The Mayor was part of a joint news conference this afternoon hosted by the Spokane County Department of Emergency Management to announce these actions.

The declarations speed up the processes for county and city organizations to rapidly deploy funding and resources; seek state and federal resources; and grant greater flexibility to work with existing local labor agreements.

Suspending Water Shut-Offs

The City is suspending water service shut-offs for non-payment of City utility bills and won't charge fees for late utility payments until further notice. The changes are part of the City's efforts to ease the strain on City

utility customers during widespread closures of schools and small businesses because of COVID-19.

"Today, we are helping to ensure that our citizens will have access to clean and safe water for drinking, hand washing and keeping their families safe," says Mayor Nadine Woodward. "Our lives have become very different in the last few days, and at the City, we recognize that our families may face financial hardships as a result of the changes being implemented to slow the spread of this disease."
