A Message from Mayor Woodward

Spokane, like all communities across the state, recently hit a bump in the road. Case counts have risen with the more widespread introduction of the Delta variant. Simultaneously the rate of new vaccinations has slowed considerably.

The result has been a significantly increasing burden on the healthcare system impacted by unvaccinated individuals. The corresponding ripple effect has been a rekindling of polarizing disagreements and nasty banter between differing sides of the debate.

Disagreement is okay, even healthy when done respectfully. Unfortunately, the level of disrespect is rising right along with the frustration over the prolonged duration of the pandemic and the limitations it has placed on all of us.

I recently had the opportunity to attend Unity in the Community, an event to promote connectivity through education and awareness. One of my takeaways was the reinforcement of my strong belief that people can always find common ground around which to come together in conversation and ultimately work together.

Masking Guidance
